

Church visits









Thanks to Gill and Sue for organising the Church Visit group to the Church of St John the Baptist at Tiffield this Wednesday, where we were given talks by the church warden Mike Dean and his wife Sylvia.

The church consisted of only a nave and north aisle in the 1200's, but was gradually extended. In 1856 St John's Reformatory for young offenders was built which grew from 30 to 80 boys, who were marched down to the church which was extended to include them at a cost of about £400. The Victorians, of course, changed and 'improved' the church building: replacing the box pews, getting an harmonium and extending the chancel (the wealthy Rev. Harcourt Delafons had the main window dedicated to his daughter, who died aged 8 in 1870 and another window to his wife.

In 1897 the clock was put in to celebrate Victoria's Diamond Jubilee (cost £90) and in 1937 electricity arrived (£44 - paid over 3 years). A new organ with bellows 1909 (£100 + £3 for transport & fitting) which lasted for 54 years. The 3 bells have been designed to be rung by 1 person - a system copied by a local man from the Rev. Henry Thomas Ellacombe who had been an engineer working for Marc Kingdom Brunel (Isambard's father) who had got fed up of dealing with unreliable, drunken bell ringers!

Recorder Playing



Our group of players were very pleased to receive an enquiry from a lady who has recently joined Towcester u3a and spotted our group. She had played the recorder in a group 25 years ago and has decided to try and refresh her skills and she is going to join us for a taster session.

We are keen as a group that people should discover that recorder playing isn't always the painful squeaky sound of children beginning to learn to play the descant recorder! I have been learning to play both the treble and tenor recorders since retiring, and would recommend it as a satisfying and enjoyable activity both on one's own or as a member of a group.

The site has been recorded with GPS and the wreck has now been moved to outside the Heritage Centre on Sanday, awaiting decisions by various experts. Boys Toys 2 group go mad like the March Hare!







London Explorers – go to the Moon!



On our March trip to London, a group of LE2 members went to The Lightroom near Kings Cross to see the current production of "The Moonwalkers: a journey with Tom Hanks". Whilst sitting on benches dotted around the square room, we were reminded of the background and achievements of the incredible Apollo space missions with the aid of the Lightroom's powerful projection and technology. It was in 1961 that President John F Kennedy described space as a new frontier and proposed that the US should commit to landing a man on the Moon and returning him safely to Earth before the end of the decade not because it's essential but because we choose to go to the Moon. And then a few years later- lift off!!



We felt as though we were there with Neil Armstrong on Apollo 11 in 1969 as he took his famous small step for man and a giant leap for mankind and remembered that the first electric car was the one that went to the Moon on the Apollo 15 mission in 1971. We were also treated to interviews between Hanks and astronauts of the current Artemis programme preparing for the next

mission to the Moon in September 2026.

The Moonwalkers production has obviously proved to be very popular as booking has been

extended until mid-October 2024 and will run in tandem with an exhibition of art by David Hockney.

It doesn't matter, for I love your taste so much.


And Stilton? That's a very different sort
